Spring Forward:

Daylight savings time starts on Sunday, March 13. Watch out for early morning joggers and dog walkers since it will be darker in the mornings. And for those of you who do those early jaunts, please wear reflective clothing so drivers can see you easily. Your safety is important!

Annual Garage Sale Details:

Our fabulous annual Spring Garage Sale is coming up—April 8 and 9. Our sales are always well attended and people come from far away to snag those items you can live without. It is a great opportunity to clean out your garage and closets. Your excess can become someone else's treasures.

Yard Work:

As you start to prepare your lawns, trees, and shrubs for summer, please remember that we may encounter water restrictions as summer approaches. It is hard to remember our past severe water shortages after a year of devastating rain and tragic floods. Our newer neighbors may be unaware how quickly those water bills escalate in severe shortages. In addition, users can be fined if they violate water-usage restrictions imposed during dry periods. And even worse, those newly purchased, non-native plants will shrivel and die a dusty, quick death. Local nurseries provide expert advice and counsel on what to purchase, where to plant, how to mulch to preserve moisture, and most importantly, what to expect.

Pruning:

Follow Texas A&M's recommendation for pruning trees — Do not prune between February 15 and June 15. Sap feeding beetles target freshly cut trees during this time and will infect them with tree wilt. Our native Live Oak trees are especially susceptible to insects and disease. When is it safest to prune? Pruning periods are between December 1 and February 1, or between July 1 and October 1. When in doubt ask a certified Texas arborist for an opinion. Need that opinion quickly? Search "certified arborist San Marcos Texas" using an Internet search engine. Three or four resources will pop right up. Help preserve our very special oak trees!

Deed Restrictions and Covenants:

We have 15 different sections in Willow Creek Estates and each area has individual deed restrictions and covenants. The restrictions are enforceable, none of them are difficult to follow and all are meant to ensure our "single-family-residence" neighborhood remains a great place to live. Whether or not you are a financially supporting member of WCHOA, you still must abide by the restrictions governing your section.

If you're aware of a situation that could be a violation, please take a moment to report it to the WCHOA Board by using the "Report Restrictions Violation" form on our website or sending an email to wchoa99@gmail.com. If you live in one of the areas of Willow Creek



that has mandatory dues, report the suspected violation to a member of the Board of your mandatory HOA that would be "The Ridge HOA" or "The Ridge II HOA". We'll do

our best to resolve issues that are found to be in violation of our restrictions/covenants fairly and quickly.

You should have received a copy of your deed restrictions and covenants at closing when you purchased your Willow Creek property. However, if you did not, or you need another copy, you can find it on our website www.wchoatx.com under "HOA Info".

Speed Bumps and Speed Detector Machines:

Thank you for observing speed limits on our streets. The city installed two "miles per hour" speed detectors on Stagecoach Trail. These devices indicate your speed and "flash" signal you if you're exceeding the speed limit. We have noticed a drop in speed since their installation and it is most appreciated. We have many walkers and joggers in our area who listen to music as they exercise. This means they cannot hear car noise. Sometimes dogs are being walked and may get loose and run into the middle of the street. Safe, slower speeds help prevent accidents.

Street Lights:

Street light out? Call 512-393-8313 for assistance. Street lights operate on photocells and should never be out at night. So, if the light is out at night or remains on during the day, call and report it. Good street lighting helps keep our streets safe at night and reduces the chance of theft and vandalism.

Lost and Found:

The lost and found section on our web site has had many successes this past year. Glasses, rings, wallets, phones, and pets have been reunited with their owners. Most importantly, several dogs and cats have been returned to their very worried owners. Note that even if a pet is indoor only, you should be prepared. Pets can be quick and nimble, and it



just takes a quick distraction for Rover or Fluffy to slide outside. Therefore, it makes sense to chip indoor pets because, if they do get out, they get confused or

frightened and can disappear very quickly. A chip makes a real difference to reunite a pet with its owner. Contact your local veterinarian for assistance. And if you are adopting a rescued animal, a chip is a must.
